Dementia Friends

Dementia nurse Shiobhan Pickering is working with Health and Social care students in years 10 and 11 running dementia friends sessions with information on dementia and how we can all help people living with it to have a fulfilling and meaningful life in our community.

Each session ended with the students writing on the board what they had learned through the talk, the year 10's had 10 new things. Some where, dementia is not just about loss of memory, that dementia is an umbrella term for lots of disease of the brain and that there are around 350 people living in Axminster with Dementia. The year 11's had learned some new things too. People can live well with dementia and that sometimes a person with dementia may see things that are not always there, like a black mat might look like a hole in the ground and that we have lots of support for people to live with dementia in their own homes.

They also agreed to sign up to be dementia friends, <u>www.dementiafriends.org.uk</u>, wear their badge with pride and spread the word.

Why do we believe the things we do?

Does the Extent of Evil and Suffering Mean that God cannot exist?



The lecturers delivering the topics for discussion were Julie Arliss, Professor Tom Greggs and Dr Stephen Law. Both students agreed that it was a challenging day raising many more questions than answers that would be reflected upon.

Megan commented: Many elements of the masterclass were very interesting, as controversial philosophical questions and concepts were addressed and debated. Many of the subjects broached by the lecturers really made you stop and think about how we live our lives, and what truly is the right or wrong thing to do in a given situation.

Abigail commented: I found the Masterclass to be very insightful and felt privileged to be there as we were among experts from all over the country who had come to talk to us for the day. We covered thought provoking philosophical issues; I'm not a Philosophy student myself but the ideas we discussed were incredible and gave me a better understanding into not just university and my potential desired subject choices but life itself and the importance of it, I would highly recommend this trip to anyone who has the opportunity to go.

Fund Raising

On Friday 24th February Sixth Formers organised a social breakfast for all staff. A wonderful selection of pastries and filled breakfast rolls plus tea and coffee were on offer. Students made £80 that will go towards the local charity 'The Project' and their prom fund. Visiting speakers

The 6th Form separated during PSHE last week with Year 13 having a guest speaker from Aberystwyth University outreach team, Harriet Greatrex who spoke to the students on what they can expect from University Life.

Year 12 had members from the food industry talking about the Feeding Britain Future Programme stores represented Asda, Marshfields Bakery who came into discuss the hidden job opportunities within the industry and what students could do to prepare and improve their chances at interview. The session covered what perspective employers looked for in their applicants and students were asked to select candidates from a selection of mock application forms.

Many of the successful initiatives would not have been possible without the amazing teams who supported them through Prom organisation, Christmas lunch for the elderly and many fundraising events. Well done Sixth Form we are so proud of you.



Lessons from Auschwitz

Two students from Axe Valley Community College Sixth Form have been selected to go on an educational trip, the memories and learning from which, will stay with them for a lifetime. Patrick Flanagan and Ryan Loveridge had to submit a written application explaining why they wanted to be part of this Holocaust trust experience. This Project is an innovative four part course which gives students the opportunity to visit the Nazi death and concentration camp, Auschwitz-Birkenau.

Initially, Patrick and Ryan had to attend an Orientation Seminar to learn about pre-war Jewish life and hear a Holocaust survivor's testimony and prepare for the visit to Poland. On the 1st March the students will have a very early start from Exeter Airport. When in Poland, local experts will guide them through the memorial and museum and educators from the Trust will lead group discussions.

When back in UK, there will be a follow up seminar, where participants will be able to reflect on their experiences, considering the contemporary lessons of the Holocaust and devise practical ways of passing on this information and learning in their role as Holocaust Ambassador.

Ryan, who is currently studying Politics says he "wants to learn more about this very significant part of history and it's wide reaching implications. I am keen to share this knowledge as one of the Ambassadors"

Patrick has an interest in World War 2, he is a Law student and believes that this opportunity will contribute to his understanding of historic legal aspects of war within Europe. Both students plan to run an Assembly for the 6th Form on their return using slideshows and direct quotes from those they have spoken to including the trip including the Holocaust Survivor and others who have lost loved ones in the camps.





Jack Bennett reaches regional finals of prestigious Tpas 2017 awards

Jack Bennett, Year 13, had his outstanding service to sport in the community rewarded by a place at the regional final of the prestigious Tpas awards 2017, which was held at a ceremony in London on 3 February.

Finalist Jack, aged 17, made the shortlist for the young tenant of the year category at the finals having been nominated for the award by Victoria Robinson, East Devon Community Development worker and lead worker of the Millwey SWITCH club. She was determined that Jack should receive acknowledgement for his work in the Axe Valley community, at SWITCH and at Millwey Rise football club.

Commenting on the trip to London to attend the finals, Victoria said: "It was great to see his commitment to sport in his community recognised, not just by the community, but on a wider scale. Jack has been coming to my club since we started and it has been lovely to see him develop his leadership skills and his sense of community spirit."




Valentine roses


It was great fun to deliver them and see the reactions of the people who received a rose. The money we raised will be split between our prom and a local charity called The Project.

Berlin Trip








Day 1: Our first visit was down a cobbled street in the outskirts of Berlin to the eerie Plotenzsee Execution Centre, where opponents of the Nazi regime including some of the Staffenburg bomb plot met a grisly end...

Next it was the famous Olympic Stadium home to Herta Berlin football club, the 1935 Olympics, and Berlin's mascot the Bear. Some of us ran round the stadium, seeing the outdoor Olympic pool and the gift shop for football merchandise.







Day 2: Next to the Grunewald deportation station where Berlin Jews were dispatched East to Concentration Camps and Ghettos. Before being dropped off in Berlin centre for lunch at Alexanderplatz then taking the S-Bahn to the old secret zone of East Berlin, which was left as a blank on Soviet Maps. We entered the Secret Police Stasi Prison, and were guided around the cells, the interrogation rooms and saw the arrest van, and open air exercise cell.

Day 3: On a very cold -6c morning we visited Sachsenhausen memorial, the site of the Berlin work













and concentration camp complex. We saw barracks, kitchens, the gun shot execution facility and crematoria along with the mortuary. For lunch we visited a favourite destination for a warming lunch of Schnitzel and chips, the old East German Remus Restaurant with it's wood panelling.

The afternoon was to be spent outside Berlin; first passing over the famous Gernicke bridge of Spies between East and West which saw the exchange of American Spy plane pilot Gary Powers. We then set off for Potsdam the location for the final conference of the big 3 (Stalin, Churchill & Roosevelt) which decided the future for Germany at the end of WW2. The evening was spent quizzing.

Thanks to Miss Coghlan, Mr Ramsbottom and Mr Irvine and Steve our guide who gave up their break and sleep to make this possible, and to all the students who kept us amused and made the whole trip fun.

On the 28th February a group of 12 REACH students visited Newton Abbot, firstly the hugely successful and dynamic dancewear distributors IDS and then secondly for a hairdressing workshop with South Devon College.

IDS's HR Manager showed us around the business from the costume showroom which delighted the girls with the incredible range of sparkly and showy tutus and outfits,



through the distribution area in the main warehouse where they met with the warehouse manager and some of the pickers, followed by the sales team in adjoining offices. The students talked to the marketing manager who told them about the global scale of the business and encouraged them to work hard at their languages. Finally we met with the Managing Director and one of his innovation team and talked about the exciting initiatives they are working on to continue to expand and grow the business. We were delighted to hear the girls chattering about setting up their own dance studios and businesses back on the bus.

Next stop we visited the South Devon College Hairdressing studio where the students had a taster session alongside a group of 2nd year students. The girls were given a demonstration and then had a chance to try out styling for themselves. It was a particular bonus to be working alongside the other students and a fantastic way for the girls to see first-hand what it would be like to study hairdressing at college.

Double Elephant Printing Workshop

On the 8th February Simon Ripley from the Double Elephant Printing team and Mollie Beattie, 3rd Year printmaking student from Plymouth University visited us to work with two groups of students. Firstly the primary ASPIRE students had a wonderful time working on the theme "Taking Flight", creating beautiful layered pictures of birds, planes, rockets, kites and butterflies. They worked using a block printing technique and then progressed to a layering technique.

In the afternoon secondary ASPIRE students worked on the theme of "Tolerance" creating images showing friendship, cultural differences and the developing world. It was a very challenging theme that the students worked on with incredible imagination. The second part of the session the students learned the etching technique of scratching designs onto acrylic and then printing the results with black ink through the press. The results were fantastic and the students very proud of their fabulous work.













Powderham Castle, Classical Music Event

On 24th February we visited the beautiful Powderham Castle for a concert of Opera and Gilbert and Sullivan pieces. The performers were five final year students from the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama who sang in French, Italian and German as well as in English. The pieces included examples by Johann Strauss and Mozart from "Die Fledermaus", "Le nozze di Figaro" and "Cosi fan tutte" as well as fun and comedic pieces by Gilbert and Sullivan such as the Policeman's song from "The Pirates of Penzance".

The event was held in the elegant James Wyatt Music Room that is decorated in pink and green and highly ornate with a white marble fireplace, alabaster vases, mirrors and 17th century organ. The castle is a fabulous and magnificent backdrop for this series of classical music events and we are very grateful to the Earl and Countess of Devon for hosting these.


