I am so grateful to all those who have given their time and money to support these events.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to Tracy Moran who will be leaving us at the end of term. Tracy has been working at Axe Valley for more than 24 years and during her time here has inspired thousands of young people to take part and compete in sport. Her commitment to the benefits of participation and her dedication to the PE department through both academic study and extra-curricular activities has marked her out as a legend within the community. I know that you will join with me in wishing her every success in the future.

I hope that you have a very happy Christmas and New Year and look forward to starting 2018 at Axe Valley on Tuesday 2nd January.

Congratulations to this group of year 10 students who ran a multi-terrain 5km sponsored run and raised a staggering £497.50!






STEM Workshop

Anti-bullying Week, 13-17 November



Also, the week after, students from the Learning Support Department hand printed a section of wall to support the differences and equalities theme.



community for many years". She is part of the Devon Satellite Academy where young talented performers can develop their skills and work their way up from grass roots to the elite level.




