

Several gained places at top Russell Group universities and others earned apprenticeships and employment in the local area. Mr Davies has for years been a highly active supporter of The Minster Challenge as well as being a veteran runner of the course. For better or for worse he had someone to drag around with him this year.



Pen Recycling

Axe Valley Academy have registered as a local collection point for recycling pens in a project sponsored by Bic.

We can take biros, board pens, highlighters, permanent markers, Tippex pens - and as a bonus, we also take any Tippex containers (bottles, mice etc., of any brand) and mechanical pencils - but not wooden pencils, rulers or glue sticks.

We have collecting tubs in classrooms, and lots more available (in C4) for students to take home for friends and family, workplaces, clubs etc. The assemblies to officially launch the project with students will be soon after half term.
