


Year 8 Ecosystem Project

German Exchange

In November, a group of Year 9 and 10 students took part in the German Exchange visit to Kirchweyhe (near Bremen). As a member of staff new to the school, I was delighted with the students' enthusiasm, willingness and bravery in putting their German language skills to good use. The students were active participants in a variety of lessons in the school (KGS Kirchweyhe) and some of our students were identified by the German teachers as being extremely competent in various subject areas, including Physics and Maths.

English and German students engaged in a number of discussions, sharing thoughts, ideas and opinions about the different school systems, Christmas traditions and Brexit. If given the choice, most English students would have voted to remain in the EU with all German students stating they would definitely have voted to remain.

There was a mixed response about the preference for either the German or the English school systems, with the topics of school uniform and Sitzenbleiben being hotly debated!

A range of activities took place throughout the week both locally and further afield in Bremen and Hamburg:



A Question of Taste - DNA Workshop

On Wednesday 24th January, Mrs Bishop and Mrs Jenkins accompanied the Year 12 and 13 A level Biology students to a DNA workshop at "We The Curious" in Bristol. Over 2,500 students take part in this popular PCR workshop for Post 16 students each year.

This full day laboratory-based workshop explored an unusual human trait - whether you can taste a bitter chemical PTC. Using DNA extraction, PCR and gel electrophoresis, students investigated their own DNA to discover if they possess the bitter taste gene. The social and moral implications surrounding these genetic technologies were also discussed.

A good day was had by all and the staff were very impressed with our students saying they were the best group they had ever had.

National Citizen Service

We welcomed the NCS team to assembly so they could launch an amazing opportunity for all Year 11 school leavers in the summer. NCS in the South West is run by Exeter City's Community Trust and they have designed a 3 week programme aimed at 15 to 17 year olds living in England and their aims are "to make extraordinary friendships, learn the skills they don't teach you in class and create unforgettable memories."

The 3 week programme starts after the GCSE exams and week 1 involves a 5 day residential in the Brecon Beacons in Wales. Living in a festival style campsite, students will have the opportunity to take part in a range of outdoor activities. Week 2 is a 5 day residential at Bicton College where they experience a series of practical activities and workshops aimed at getting them ready for Post-16 study and independent living. The final week involves students working in teams to create a community action event.

The cost of the course is £50 but students received a £10 voucher so could have all of these amazing opportunities for just £40. All transport and food is included in the cost. They have already received information packs and lots of them were really excited to get involved.

ASPIRE

Exeter University Language Project

This term ASPIRE will be working with Exeter University Languages Faculty to give students a taster of a variety of languages in workshops at school culminating in a celebration day at the University.

Portuguese was the first language tackled with lecturer Carla Azevedo. The students learnt how to introduce themselves and to talk about their favourite hobbies. They also enjoyed a quiz about Portuguese and Brazilian culture.

PhD Student Edward Mills visited us last week to give a workshop on French and particularly the development of French and English dating back to Medieval times. The students looked at examples of French manuscripts and designed their own versions in similar style focusing on using the imperative form of verbs.



Wood Turning Workshops

Colwin Way and Ben Beddows from Axminster Tools and Machinery Skill Centre have been working with our students creating beautiful pens.

The students from Years 7 & 8 were shown how to use the industrial lathes and wood turning tools to convert raw blocks of wood into elegant pen barrels which they then polished and assembled.

Each of the workshops had students fully absorbed in their creations. As we walked out of the centre one of the students remarked "I am so unbelievably happy right now!". They all behaved in an exemplary way and were inspired and proud of their achievements.






Norman Lockyer Observatory Visit

On the 24th January a group visited the Norman Lockyer Observatory for a discussion about astronomy with expert David Strange.

The students were then given a tour of the famous telescopes in the Observatory buildings and visited the computer room where they learnt about comets, the aurora borealis and shooting stars.

Lastly we enjoyed the Planetarium show with detailed explanations of the size and structure of the night sky.



Skills for Success Workshop


