Year 7

Our focus this term has been on using the Microsoft office package to develop a Mr Men story. Students have created their own 8 page story with their own characters.



Year 8

Our Year 8 students took on the challenge of creating a TV Advert for a fictional water park called 'Aquastranza' using a new piece of software to amazing ends!

Year 9

In Computer Science students have learnt a whole new language called binary, developed our Python skills where we created a version of the game Mastermind and learned about different types of storage technologies and why there are used in different scenarios.

In Creative iMedia students have focused on the tools and techniques that support the creative processes to develop digital media products.

Year 10

In Computer Science students have been learning different program concepts such as arrays and iteration along with getting an understanding of how networks are structured and how they work.



NUTRITIONAL FACTS & FOOD PREP EXAMS

Thursday 26th November

Unit objective - To discover nutritional needs.

All the nutrients are vital but iron, zinc and VC are needed from 6 months.

Protein, calcium, VD, iron, VC, B group vitamins.

Protein, calcium, VD, VC, iron.

Children (1-12):

- Children need to eat regular, smaller meals/snacks/drinks due to growth and fast metabolism.
- High energy needs due to growth and activity.
- Reduced sodium and sugar.
- Introduce a variety of foods.
- Guide 2-5 years old.

Teenagers:

- Follow the eatwell guide.
- They have growth spurts and are very active, so high energy needs.
- Increased appetites mean larger portion sizes are needed.

Adults:

- Lower energy needs.
- Need to avoid foods high in sugar and fat to prevent weight gain.

Babies:

- Ideally breast milk for the first six months.
- After six months introduce a variety of foods.
- High energy needs due to growth.
- No added salt and free sugar.
- Introduce a variety of foods.

Pregnancy:

- Healthy balanced diet, prepared safely.
- Include plenty of watery drinks.
- Higher energy needs for last 3 months of pregnancy.

Folic acid (especially at the start of pregnancy), protein, calcium, VD, VC and iron.






YEAR 9 GEOGRAPHY
