

THIS TERM AT AVA

WE WERE HONOURED to have the chance to listen to a presentation from Holocaust survivor, Henry Schachter. Our Year 9 History students and Year 11s, listened intently, as Henry told his story of endurance at a time when the Nazis tragically persecuted millions of Jewish people. Mr Schachter's family escaped Germany for Poland after the Kristallnacht attacks in 1938 but then fled to Belgium after Poland was invaded when Mr Schachter was just a baby. To protect him from the Nazis, his mother selflessly gave her child to a Christian family so that he would not be targeted. Both Mr Schachter's parents were killed whilst being held captive by the Nazis. His mother was sent to Belsen on the same convoy as Anne Frank and died of typhoid just four days before the camp's liberation. His father was shot when attempting to escape after a death march to Flossenburg.





Thanks to the bravery of Holocaust survivors, talking to us, we can shine a light on one of history's darkest chapters.





GOOD TURN-OUT AT OWL PELLET DISSECTION CLUB.

- PELLET DISSECTION CLUB. What are Bars Owl pellets? Barn Owns are unable to digest the fur and bone of their peru, which they usually availow whole. The indigestible parts are regurgated cooughed up or through the beak) in the form of an owl pellet. After feeding, producing a pellet takes 8 hours or more. After reach right's frunting an owl regurgates 1 or 2 pellets. Barn Owl pellets are typically about the size of a man's thumb

- Pellets often contain the remains of 4 or 5 small mammuls. Pellet dissection can tell you exactly what an owl has eaten.

- enactly what an oel has eaten. The Barn Ow's diet consists mainly of small mammats perfocularly: Fried Vales (45% of total britsh Barn Owi dec. Controls Streets (20%). Vielo Mice (15%). Vielo and Pigmy Streets are also taken. We found a great deal of bores and were able to identify and Clean up a huge variety of specimens.

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




